The Victorian Society in America (VSA) and the Alumni Association (AA) of the Victorian Society Summer Schools convey their deepest gratitude to Prof. Richard Guy Wilson for his outstanding service to the Newport Summer School.

Born and raised in Los Angeles, Richard Guy Wilson (known to all as "RGW") received his Ph.D. on the work of architect Charles F. McKim at the University of Michigan. He taught at Michigan and lowa State University before moving in 1976 to the University of Virginia, where he served for many years as Commonwealth Professor of Architectural History. Richard's research and writing have focused on American architecture from the 18th through the 20th centuries. He has authored, co-authored, or edited many books, and became a "celebrity" as the host on the popular A&E Network program *America's Castles*. RGW has been accorded numerous honors including a Guggenheim Fellowship, a Visiting Fellowship to Cambridge University, the outstanding professor award at University of Virginia, prizes for his distinguished writing, and an honorary membership of the American Institute of Architects.

RGW served as Director of the Victorian Society's Summer School in the U.S. for 43 years, beginning with programs in Boston and Philadelphia, then focusing on Newport from 1987. The verbal tributes and photographs presented in this special edition of the Alumni Newsletter reflect the profound respect and affectionate gratitude that almost a thousand Newport Summer School alumni feel for his creation and leadership of this prestigious program.

On June 1, 2025, a large crowd of RGW fans gathered at the Isaac Bell House—a site he helped save from destruction—to salute him. Kindly hosted by Trudy Coxe, CEO and Executive Director of the Preservation Society of Newport County, that celebration included a presentation to Richard of a beautifully bound volume of photographs from past Newport Summer Schools, snapshots contributed by admiring alumni from around the world. Those same photographs appear in the present document, now accompanied by more than 20 verbal tributes.

Today we raise a virtual glass to RGW and to the marvelous community of kindred spirits that his inspired leadership has generated for more than 40 years.

June 1, 2025

Thank you all for being here tonight to celebrate the legacy of Richard Guy Wilson. Although I cannot be with you in person, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the impact Richard Guy Wilson – known to all as "RGW" – has had not just with the Victorian Society and its hundreds of students in Newport, but on my personal journey.

I was one of the lucky people chosen to participate in the Newport Summer School in 2013, just one year after I had finished my master's degree in history. I applied to strengthen my knowledge of Victorian interiors to aid me in my role at a local historic house museum. I arrived expecting a series of tours and lectures but left with an entirely new appreciation for the work I did and its place in the world.

RGW's 'March Through Newport', as the students dubbed it, quite literally changed my life. It inspired me to reach new professional heights, including writing a local history book, becoming the Executive Director of that house museum, and eventually joining the board of directors of the Victorian Society in America. I am now entrusted with supporting two of our nation's most sacred nineteenth century spaces, the Gettysburg Battlefield and Soldier's National Cemetery, as a direct result of the confidence and clarity of purpose RGW inspired in me. RGW was the catalyst for my career, and I cannot thank him enough.

If you have also been a student of RGW, and have been similarly impacted, I invite you to join me in offering your gratitude today and in the days that follow. Richard Guy Wilson, thank you for all you have done!




The following remarks were delivered at the June 1, 2025 reception honoring RGW at the Isaac Bell House.

Greetings! I am delighted to join the "RGW Admiration Society" gathered here tonight!

I am wearing a number of hats (as the expression goes) – from a longtime association with the Preservation Society of Newport County, to the Education Society of the Victorian Society in America, to participation in the Summer School programs – but it's the Victorian Society that has really been the "thread" through which my friendship with Richard began.

In fact, among the many people here, I may be among those who have known you the longest, Richard. If my memory is correct, it all goes back to a Victorian Society conference in Philadelphia in the 1970s, when you gave a talk on Edith Wharton. At the time, I was researching a thesis on Ogden Codman, who, as we know, co-authored with Edith *The Decoration of Houses*, which became the "Bible" for classical design taste in Newport and elsewhere. Despite our different opinions as to who made the greater contribution to the book, it was the beginning of a long friendship, appreciation of 19th-century architecture and decorative arts, and mutual enjoyment of many aspects of 19th-century taste and design.

Prior to the establishment of the Victorian Society Summer School here in Newport in 1987, there were a couple of earlier programs – starting in Boston, then Philadelphia – in which I participated. For all of them, Richard demonstrated his full command of the 19th-century architecture in these places.

How the years have flown! For me, one key aspect of the Summer School has been the many friendships that have ensued. Especially in the early years, members of the Education Committee of the VSA worked hard to establish the program through recruitment events around the country and across the Atlantic, and most importantly through raising scholarship funds. I might add that this aspect of the Victorian Society certainly has not changed.

In the early years, as a Rhode Islander (though from the other side of the Bay), I helped Richard with a few personal contacts – for visiting some houses, R&R stops, and somewhat hidden places off Bellevue Avenue. The result has been an immersion in, and appreciation for, many aspects of history and culture, not only here but in other places, mostly in Rhode Island.

Alas, I feel I must mention some of the special Victorian Society members involved in the Summer School's earlier years who are no longer with us – Billie Britz, Bill Dane, Gwen Koch – and who helped make the program so enjoyable. The many years in which Richard directed the Newport experience have provided great memories for many who continue to partake in the program.





